**Supporters say** that as the coronavirus pandemic spreads, we must take care of those who are working hard. It is critical for workers to not have to worry about losing their job or a paycheck if they need to take time off because they are sick. Paid sick days will encourage workers to stay home to prevent them from infecting others and prevent an even worse impact on businesses. **Supporters say** that as the coronavirus pandemic spreads, it will be critical for workers to have the time to care for loved ones without losing their jobs or a paycheck. In the long-term, this proposal keeps our families and workplaces strong because it enables people to balance their work with caring for sick children and other family members.
